

# Who to Contact When You Have a Food Safety Complaint



In Canada, the responsibility for food safety is shared between the federal government and provincial health units or departments. Depending on your concern, and the type of food business involved, there are different departments you should contact.

- If you suspect you are experiencing symptoms due to a foodborne illness, or have a severe allergic reaction, seek medical attention.
- If you have a food safety concern, use the contact numbers below to report to the proper agency. All agencies work together, so your complaint will be assessed and redirected, if necessary.
