PROCLAMATION

TO OUR BELOVED AND FAITHFUL the Members elected to serve in the Legislative Assembly of our Province of Manitoba, and to each and every of you - GREETING.

WHEREAS the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Manitoba now stands adjourned;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed appropriate to request the Administrator by a Royal Proclamation effective on the fifth day of April, 1999, to prorogue the Fourth Session of the Thirty-Sixth Legislature of the Province of Manitoba and to summon the said Legislature for the dispatch of business on the sixth day of April, 1999;
